Principal's News

How Does the P & C Support the School?

The role of the Parents and Citizens Association in all Queensland state schools is to build a sense of community and to undertake fundraising initiatives which support the purchase of identified and agreed upon resources for the school. These resources can be both human and physical in nature.

Essentially, every parent or caregiver is a member of the parent community and as such has a responsibility to participate in some way to enhance the resources of the school, all of which benefit your children.

Prep Vision Screening Program

The State Government is offering a prep-aged vision screening program to all primary schools in Queensland. This involves registered nurses screening the vision of children in their first year of formal schooling. Early identification of vision problems can result in better school achievement and health outcomes which lead to more productive and healthier lives across the lifespan. There is no charge for the provision of this prep student vision screening service.

Prep parents can use the web address below to access the Online Consent Form. The form must be completed by **Friday 05 March 2021**. This information was emailed to all Prep parents.

Prep Intake 2022

As per the Enrolment Management Plan, only students whose principal place of residence is within the school's catchment area will be eligible for enrolment at the school. Students who are siblings of current* students at the school are also deemed eligible for enrolment. We are therefore requesting that younger siblings of students that will be current in 2022 who are eligible for prep in 2022 complete the enrolment forms and lodge with the office as soon as possible. A reminder of the age rules for prep 2022: If you have a child born from 1 July 2016 – 30 June 2017 he/she is eligible for prep enrolment in 2022 at Frenchville State School. Please complete an enrolment form and return it to Frenchville State School.

2021 - Student online consent

Parents will soon receive an email link to an online student consent survey. Our school uses a range of online services, including websites, web applications, and mobile applications to help facilitate learning. Each child requires parental consent to access identified online environments in 2021. The provided survey link is designed to help simplify the annual online consent process. This consent has been done through a paper copy brought home by the students in the past. Paper copies will be available from the school office if required. Consent through the survey will only be required in the future for new enrolments and again for year 4 students as they have access to a different range of platforms in the upper school to the lower school.

The online survey email provides a <u>unique ID and access code</u> <u>for each student</u> attending Frenchville State School. The survey cannot be accessed until the individual codes are provided. If you have more than one child enrolled at the school you will receive multiple copies of the same email. Parents are required to <u>complete the survey for each child</u> attending Frenchville State School in 2021.

Queensland state schools embrace a multitude of cultural, religious and non-religious beliefs. Under the *Education* (*General Provisions*) *Act 2006*, schools are to provide Religious Instruction (RI) if approached by a faith group seeking to provide RI and students of that faith attend the school. RI informs students about the beliefs and values of a particular religion. It is delivered by volunteers of a faith group using instructional materials approved by that faith group. RI is required to be consistent with legislation and Department of Education policies and procedures.

All RI instructors must hold a blue card and participate in compulsory Student Protection and Code of Conduct training. RI instructors are only entitled to deliver the RI programs outlined below. A school staff member will be present during the delivery of RI.

Participation in RI is not compulsory. Any student (except Prep students) may participate in RI if a parent has provided written instructions to the school. Students are allocated to RI based on information provided by parents on the completed Application for student enrolment unless other written instructions have been provided to the school.

Note: This consent remains in effect unless the parent informs the school otherwise in writing.

Religious instruction lessons commence on Thursday 18 February. Religious instruction is conducted on: Thursdays 1:35-2:05pm Years 2,3,4; 2:10-2:40pm Years 1,5,6. The list of faith groups that provide religious instructors to deliver an authorised program is shown below:

Other Instruction

Students who are not participating in RI will be provided with other instruction in a separate supervised location. Other instruction must relate to part of a subject area already covered in class and may include, but is not restricted to:

- personal research and/or assignments
- revision of class work such as creative writing or literacy and/or numeracy activities
- wider reading such as independent reading appropriate to the student.

Parents will be advised of any changes to the RI and other instruction programs to ensure they are able to make an informed decision on their child's participation.

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
NAPLAN Online for Year 3 & Year 5 - 11-21 May


This year, **between 11 and 21 May**, our Year 3 & Year 5 students will be doing **NAPLAN Online**. Our students and teachers use ICT every day, making us confident and capable with ICT. Our classrooms have kept pace with technology, so it's a natural progression that we assess using ICT.


Online assessment offers many new opportunities that are often limited, or not possible, with paper-based tests. Trials by the Australian Curriculum, Assessment and Reporting Authority (ACARA) suggest students are more engaged with online tests that use a tailored test design which adapts to their knowledge and abilities. They are less likely to become discouraged as they progress through tailored tests. **This year, students in Year 3 will continue to complete the writing test using pencil and paper.** All other test components, including Year 5 writing, will be conducted in an online environment.


NAPLAN assesses literacy and numeracy skills that students are already learning at school. On its own, NAPLAN is not a test that can be studied for and students are not expected to do so. NAPLAN is just one aspect of a school's assessment and reporting process – it does not replace ongoing assessments made by teachers about student performance; however, students and parents may use individual results to discuss progress with teachers.

The infographic below shows the different components of NAPLAN and the time requirements for each year level involved.











Curriculum Updates

Attached to this email is the Term 1 Curriculum Snapshot. This outlines the basics of teaching and assessment for the term in each year level – classroom teachers may provide more detailed information during parent / teacher meetings Multi-age classrooms – this year we have two multi-age classrooms. These classes have had their curriculum designed very carefully to cover all aspects of content that needs to be taught and assessed. To ensure their topics are not overlapping with prior or future years, different learning contexts have been selected to allow for appropriate content coverage. Sometimes this might not line up with the rest of their cohort but by the end of the year, all aspects of their appropriate year level achievement standard will be covered. Student will still have the opportunity to participate in all excursions and events with their year level.

Literacy Lifting

Literacy and numeracy are the cornerstones of our curriculum and to be successful, students need to develop their skills in these areas. While pressures on families and homelife are greater than ever, it is still the little things that can make a difference. Reading is the most important skill that children learn as it underpins every other subject. Reading to students and encouraging the use of language is something that can be done simply in everyday life. What to do - every opportunity to engage your child in language is valuable - sharing stories, dinnertime conversations, reading environmental print, helping read recipes, writing shopping lists. Not only do these activities help your child's literacy development, they demonstrate the purposes of literacy in everyday life.








Library News





Knightly Tales

Reading Knights counts the number of nights that students read – this is to encourage the development of reading as an everyday habit. We encourage a minimum of 10 minutes of reading / sharing of stories. Each night that your child reads should be recorded in their Reading Knights Booklet.

Numeracy

Some things in mathematics remain consistent as is the importance of basic number fact recall - again something that can be easily slipped into everyday home activities - shopping, Tuckshop, counting pegs in pairs, etc.

Games that improve number fact recall can be played with the most basic / inexpensive items - a pack of playing cards, some dice or a set of dominoes. In the rest of this term's newsletter, there will be a simple game that will improve number facts that can be played with a pack of playing cards.



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Curriculum Snapshot

Year 2 Digital Technology

Year 2 children have been busy learning all things technology including the need for passwords and how they help protect our personal information. Each class constructed a strong password using a combination of letters, symbols and numbers.





Year 2 students have also been using an iPad application called Aging Booth to visualise what they might look like in the year 2071. They discussed how image data can be transferred between devices and have used network drives to create a visual presentation.









Year 3 Digital Technology

Year 3 students have started the year by investigating information systems and how they use a database to group information. The school's library borrowing system and Flexischools online ordering and payment platform provided two excellent, real-life examples. Each student is developing a PowerPoint slide to provide information about an important part of Frenchville State School. Individual student slides will be combined to create an information system for new year 3 students at Frenchville State School.


